World War II On The Homefront Lunch and Learn

Saturday, August 10 12:00 pm

Join local historian Michael Hardy on August 10 at noon for a Lunch and Learn on the subject of World War II on the Home Front. Mr. Hardy is the author of twenty-six books currently in print, and his articles have appeared in *Civil War Times, America's Civil War, Gettysburg* Magazine, *Confederate Veteran, Camp Chase Gazette, Carolina Mountain Life,* and the *Tar Heel Junior Historian*. He has appeared on several local television programs, and in 2016, in *Blood and Fury: America's Civil War* on the American Heroes Channel. He is a graduate of the University of Alabama, who honored him with the 2012 Alice Parker Award for Outstanding Literature and Arts. In 2010, he was named the North Carolina Historian of the Year by the North Carolina Society of Historians. That organization has also honored him with several other awards, as have the United Daughters of the Confederacy and the Sons of Confederate Veterans. In 2015, his family was honored as the Volunteers of the Year for the Pisgah District, Blue Ridge Parkway, National Park Service. Bring a bag lunch to the picnic shelter and learn more about how the War in Europe and the Pacific affected those at home. Bring your own chair to this rain or shine, free event. Tours of the house will also be available during the event for the fee of \$7 for adults and \$5 for children.



The Women of Fort Defiance: A Five Part Series

The following article is Part Three of the continuing series on the women of Fort Defiance. This issue will focus on the third generation of Lenoirs to occupy the historic property through a look at Cornelia, wife of Walter Waitstill Lenoir.

Cornelia Isabella Lenoir

"Nealy"

Cornelia Isabella Christian was born January 15, 1827 to John Brown-lee Christian and Jane Tate Christian in Augusta County Virginia. Her childhood home was at Walnut Hill, Greenville, Virginia, which is located midway between Lexington and Staunton in the Shenandoah Valley. Although she was a Virginian by birth she did have many relatives and acquaintances in Wilkes county (Caldwell County had not yet been formed) including the Harpers in Lenoir and the Pattersons in Happy Valley (Hickerson, 1962).

Cornelia's future husband Walter Waitstill Lenoir was born at Fort Defiance in 1823 to Thomas and Selina Avery Lenoir. He graduated from the University of North Carolina as the Valedictorian in 1843. He then studied law for three years and was licensed to practice law in 1846. He returned to Caldwell County afterwards and began working as an attorney in Lenoir and Boone (Cauble, 1973).

Although it is not recorded, letters between Cornelia and Walter seem to indicate that they had known each other for some time. The Pattersons at Palmyra were relatives of both and certainly could have been the genesis of their meeting. Below are transcripts of letters between the two just after they had become engaged in 1856 as taken from Hickerson's *Echoes of Happy Valley*.

My Walter,

Richmond, Va, Feby, 29th, 1856

What a nice, cunning little plan you took to have letters fixed to your mind! But then you always did have your own peculiar manner of doing every thing—I fear I shall never be able to compete with you in originality—or indeed in anything—unless it be in affection.

Thank you very much for your pretty present—I will always think of you when I see it—and like wise when I do not see it for—

"My winged thoughts do fly to thee

A thousand in an hour"

I cannot realize that we were so far apart, except when I refer to a map. I must be over 500 miles, and yet I parted from Miss Emma (Emma Cannon, at Concord, NC) only last evening! Perhaps I may be able to give you some hints that may be of use when you come to Va. You can get a through ticket at Salisbury to Goldsboro'; from there to Weldon; and from Weldon to Richmond......

Good night and goodbye!

My Nealy,

Lenoir, NC March 1st, 1856

I love you and am happy. For to love truly, only, and to tell such love, and to feel such love returned, is happiness. I send to you two sweet violets and two hearts' ease, and on every leaf of flower I send a kiss to you. I gathered the flowers for you this morning at Fort Defiance....

...I wrote to George from Jefferson, making haste in order that I might be the first myself to break the news to him. You may judge of my surprise when cousin Caroline told me at Palmyra this morning of the route you had taken. I commenced my letter to him after this wise, 'Cousin George, Nealy and I will be married to one another, God willing on the tenth day of next June.' And didn't I think I had astonished him? ... And lo! You had gone by Davidson College, and, I suppose, told it all him yourself...

The two letters, written just a day apart, shows the excitement of the young couple just after their engagement. Cornelia is clearly excited about the prospect of Walter making a trip to Richmond to see her, even giving him a step-by-step guide of exactly how to make the trip. The two would be married on June 10, 1856 at Walnut Hill.

Unfortunately, the happiness of 1856 would be short-lived. Cornelia and Walter would have a daughter named Anna born in 1857. Anna would live just six months, dying on May 27, 1858. Cornelia would also soon become ill with "galloping consumption" (Hickerson, 1962). This is a very aggressive and rapid acting form of tuberculosis that would eventually take her life on February 7, 1859.

Walter Lenoir would go on after Cornelia's Death to serve in the Civil War. On September 1, 1862, while commanding A Company of the 37th Infantry Regiment, Walter Lenoir would lose his right leg in the Battle of Ox Hill (Chantilly). He would survive the war and live until July 26, 1890. Cornelia, Walter, and Anna are all buried in the northwest corner of the Fort Defiance cemetery.






